Sir;

I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your favour of the 17th instant regarding the matter marginally noted together with copy of letter from Capt. H. A. Fraser to Mrs. Cline.

For your information beg to state that Mrs. Cline was more or less a nuisance to myself and to other Officers while we were in Kitchener - she having some message for me regarding her son about every other day.

Originally her son was a Corporal in the Signal Section, was afterwards transferred to a Company on account of inefficiency in the signalling work, and still later was reduced to the ranks for breach of discipline. This was followed by desertion on his part, and, while we have no direct evidence that his mother helped him to get away, we yet feel assured that she has always acknowledged as to his whereabouts and that she has been in continuous communication with him.

On this account the Adjutant deemed it worth while to write this woman a rather unsympathetic letter and I think that the circumstances fully warranted same although I cannot see that there was any proper authority for making the statement contained in the last sentence.

To my mind however, a little scare in the way of a bluff will not do one of her make up any harm. That is, you may feel assured she is not entitled to much consideration.
